This national conference seeks to identify the most important strategies for campaigning to enable a significant increase in walking and cycling.

The conference is open to anyone campaigning for better conditions for cycling and walking and is aimed at providing an informative, valuable and inspirational day. At just £20 it also represents outstanding value for money.

In the morning delegates will hear the policies of cycling and pedestrian organisations for 2009. There will be ample opportunity for discussion so that **you can help form how CTC, Living Streets and Cyclenation will campaign in 2009.**

This will be followed with presentations on **Road Danger Reduction through Better Driving and also the use of "Strict Liability"**. Once again questions and debate will provide excellent audience participation.

An extended 2 hr lunch break with meal provided will enable attendees to engage with the variety of "stalls" within the **Street Market**, where stall holders will present issues and information, and will be looking for your ideas and responses.

The afternoon will be devoted to the discussion of lowering urban and residential speed limits through the implementing of a default **20 mph speed limit on all residential roads.**

Besides Portsmouth already implementing 20 mph, the key towns of Oxford and Norwich will be represented by campaigners who have been involved with the ground-breaking policy of these local authorities to adopt 20 mph for residential streets.

We will hear from John Leech, MP, member of the Transport Select Committee, Liberal Democrat Transport Spokesman and who also attempted to bring in a default 20 mph speed limit as a private member's bill.

20's Plenty For Us will be presenting on how this policy is the "**golden opportunity**" to act as a catalyst for a major shift in the way communities decide to use the streets as public spaces for the good of all rather than just those who drive motor vehicles.

The conference is being organised by Warrington Cycle Campaign and 20's Plenty For Us on behalf of CTC and Cyclenation.

However the conference is not cycling specific and is targeted at all vulnerable road user campaigners and how common aspirations can lead to aligned policies and campaigns, and mutual success.

So whether you campaign for cycling, for walking, for the partially sighted, for the disabled, for the young, or for any person wanting to create a more equitable environment for all road users then this is **the essential conference for you.**
